This activity story will give children basic information about one of history's most famous composers.


Two Hymn Creators



A Musical Genius




1770-1827

Beethoven was born in Bonn, Germany. His father was his first music teacher. As a boy, he traveled from town to town playing the piano to support his family with the money he earned. He grew up to be a brilliant pianist and composer. When Beethoven was around 30 years old, he started going deaf. He composed some of his most famous music after he was deaf. He mostly composed instrumental music, such as sonatas, operas, and his famous nine symphonies. The tune for "Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee," named HYMN TO JOY, comes from Beethoven's Ninth Symphony. Beethoven was a great musical genius.

Two Hymn Creators

Henry van Dyke, Author 1852 – 1933

Henry van Dyke was a talented leader. He served as a pastor, Navy chaplain, and professor of English literature. His friend, President Woodrow Wilson, appointed him to be the United States ambassador to the Netherlands and Luxembourg. He wrote several hymns and helped prepare worship resources for the Presbyterian church.

Edward Hodges, Arranger


1796 – 1867

Edward Hodges was born in England. He developed his musical gifts as a child and became an organist and music director. He adapted a melody from the fourth movement of Beethoven's Ninth Symphony to create the HYMN TO JOY tune. Edward also had a talent for working with mechanical things. He made several important improvements in the way pipe organs were designed and built.

joyful

Joy is a fruit of the Spirit listed in Galatians 5:22-23. "Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee" Dramatic Hymn Introduction

Pitches needed:

Play each musical phrase after the preceding scripture is read. The melody may be played by bells or keyboard. The last note of each phrase may be held as an underscore to the reading of the scripture that follows. A keyboard should play with the melody as notated on the final, harmonized phrase.

Reader 1: "Our lips will shout for joy as we sing our praise to You, because Your love has rescued us."

(Psalm 71:23, paraphrase)



Reader 2: "Our hearts are filled with Your praise. We will tell everyone of Your power and majesty."

(Psalm 71:8, paraphrase)



Reader 1: "Our hope is in You, O Lord. We will praise You more and more." (Psalm 71:14, paraphrase)



Reader 2: "Who is like You, O God? You have done great things!" Reader 1 and Reader 2: "Your righteousness reaches the heavens!"
